Also called embedded liberalism, social liberal policies gained broad support across the political spectrum, because they reduced the disruptive and polarizing tendencies in society, without challenging the capitalist economic system. Once the Welfare State was created it continued to evolve over time, partly due to the changing economic circumstances in Britain, but partly due to the political ideology of the parties which moved in and out of power. 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### **The politics of welfare - Social policy**

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This period was characterised by Neo-liberal thinking, which fundamentally questioned the state-delivered institutions forming the welfare state, and these beliefs have affected policy-making and the welfare system during recent decades (Ellison, 2008: 61-67).

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An attempt has been made to include those ideologies that helped to form the welfare state (liberalism, conservatism and social democracy), those that have been instrumental in reforming the welfare state (neo-liberalism and the third way) and those that cast doubt upon the value of the welfare state (Marxism, feminism and the greens).
