Cameron uncovers what was behind law enforcement's refusal to believe that a serial killer was at work. First issued in 1941, when the national crisis made it essential for every scrap of kitchen waste and spare time to be used for increasing the nation's food resources, this book enabled the meagre official wartime rations to be supplemented in thousands of homes by a regular supply of eggs and meat, at a minimum of trouble and expense. In 1861 he took deacon's orders, but shyness and a stammer prevented him from seeking the priesthood. His most famous works, *Alice's Adventures in Wonderland* (1865) and *Through the Looking-Glass* (1872), were originally written for Alice Liddell, the daughter of the Dean of his college. Charles Dodgson died of bronchitis in 1898.
