The purpose of this volume is to explore theory, problem formulation, and methodology in "experiencing the environment." In this embryonic field, the writings of a number of individuals already stand out as representative of distinctive viewpoints. In order to facilitate further development of the field, a conference! was proposed to gather in one place representatives of a number of major viewpoints with regard to the embryonic field of "environmental psychology."
